Quick Dive Into Reading Conferences

Most independent reading conferences tend to travel one of three paths. We suggest starting with the first row and progressing as a reader shows readiness.

Book Match—Is the reader matched well to the book?

Questions/Prompts for Student:

- Tell me why you chose this book. (Probe further: "What do you like about the cover?", "What did your friend tell you about it?", "What about this author?")
- Can you read a few paragraphs out loud?
- Does this part of the book make you want to keep reading the book? Why?

Teacher Response/Next Steps:

- Explain that reading should feel enjoyable/understandable. Help them find a book like this.
- Provide supports: Audio version? A partner to read/discuss with?
- Are they reading a book that they are a content expert in or have seen the movie? Help them draw on this.

Habits—What is the reader's volume, stamina, and focus?

Questions/Prompts for Student:

- How many pages did you read in the last ___ minutes?
- What just happened in the story? Can you show me on the page?
- What are you visualizing as you read? Can you show me where?
- Who are the main characters? Tell me something about them. Can you show me where you got this idea about the character?

Teacher Response/Next Steps:

- Set a goal: Count ahead __ pages and place a goal sticky note.
- Help find a place to read that will allow greater focus.
- Put "pause" sticky notes throughout the book, at the ends of chapters or every 5-10 pages. Stop and jot at each one.
- Teach key questions for the genre they are reading (Biography: challenges? accomplishments?).

Applying Skills—Is the reader working toward standards?

Questions/Prompts for Student:

- In class, we've been working on ____.
 Can you show me where/how you practiced this in your book?
- I noticed you wrote ____. Can you tell me a bit more about what you were thinking and where in the book?
- Can you explain (concept/skill/strategy) in your own words? What are some ways readers can go about applying ____?

Teacher Response/Next Steps:

- Reteach skill with a familiar and/or short text
- Teach a different strategy aimed at the same skill
- Teach the prerequisite or lower level skill needed to reach this skill.
- Teach a new application or next level of a skill
